President's

Message

In compliance with the Illinois Community Mental Health Act (Illinois Compiled Statutes, Chapter 405, Act 20), the McHenry County Mental Health Board (MCMHB) provides this annual report to the community to outline major activities and accomplishments, sources of revenues, and expenditures for the year ending November 30, 2021.

Unprecedented times indeed.

In partnership with our funded Network Providers, the McHenry County Mental Health Board works diligently to provide an integrated quality system of care for Mental Health, Intellectual/Developmental Disability (I/DD) and Substance Use Disorder services throughout the toughest of times. These past two years have produced significant changes and challenges because of COVID-19. Responding at a rapid pace, the Mental Health Board and our system of care adjusted working or learning remotely, acclimated to virtual meetings, and hosted socially distant events and treatments within our systems, communities, and families.

As a result, 2021 has demonstrated a great deal of resiliency in our network and system of care here in McHenry County as we've continued to adapt to the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic. This adaptation has been witnessed in our network of care by new ways of working with each other as providers and a network as well as innovative solutions for McHenry County residents such as tele-health.

Many of these experiences and changes in work processes will remain as enhancements in the Network. The Mental Health Board is steadfast in supporting providers through all these challenges while evaluating for quality improvement, on-going efforts to filling gaps in services and needs for mental health, expanding

services for individuals with intellectual/developmental disabilities and substance use disorders.

By facilitating a record number of trainings for clinical, administrative, and financial Network Provider staff, the Mental Health Board continues to demonstrate its dedication and commitment to funding and helping to maintain a behavioral health and I/DD workforce prepared to meet the service needs of the community.

We proudly produced a wide array of accomplishments in the first year of our FY'21-23 Strategic Plan. A few to highlight are the McHenry County Sheriff's Office Police Social Work Program, the I/DD system expansion for Clearbrook into Woodstock, and the Pioneer/ NISRA program partnership in Huntley - see page 11 for more information.

FY21 also saw the grand opening of the New Directions Addiction Recovery Services' Retreat on January 7, 2021. The retreat will serve up to 60 people in recovery from substance use disorders. We are proud of the funding support we provided to make this happen in conjunction with the new PADs site which is administered by Pioneer and has the capacity for 70 beds for the homeless. The innovation and continued dedication within our system of care in meeting community needs is remarkable.

Overall, this report provides you with information on how local funding was used to strengthen our community and improve the lives of McHenry County residents.

We will incorporate all the variables at play from federal, state, and local level such as DHS/DMH-590/MCR, 988, CESSA, HFS-Pathway to Success, and other MH, I/DD, and SUD initiatives.

I'm excited to partner with all of you to further enhance this integrated quality system of care for Mental Health, Intellectual/Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Use Disorder services here in McHenry County and make a sustainable impact in this community.

FY21 Progress to 3-Year Plan & Achievements

Goal 1.2 Promote a MCMHB Network Culture of High Performance

As a CARF International accredited "Network," the MCMHB strives to facilitate connections, growth experiences, and collaborations that strengthen participating provider organizations and maximize the Network's collective impact for the individuals, families, and communities served.

Activities & Successes:

- Hosted FY21 Clinical Supervision Training Series (December 20/January 21)
- Notified of Three-Year CARF Accreditation (Through August 2023)
- Assisted The Break in implementing GAD-7/PHQ-9 screening tools (April 21)
- FY22 Funding Application & Outcomes Reporting revised to include outcome benchmarking, wait list criteria/processes, and ineligible referrals (May 21)
- Supported Not-for-Profit Resources (formerly Volunteer Center) Management Training Series (ongoing) Renewed sponsorship at \$2,500 for FY22 (November 21)

- Used data collected via monthly service data, utilization, outcome reporting, and compliance audits to inform the FY22 funding allocation considerations
- Provided ongoing consultation at compliance audits and at FY22 work plan development meetings regarding Evidenced Based Practices (EVPs) – fidelity to service models and use of objective measurement tools to track outcomes (December 20 – November 21)
- Filed annual report with CARF for year one of Three-Year Network Accreditation (August 21)
- YTD Network Training FY21 targeting enhanced clinical, fiscal, and management knowledge – 47 Total Trainings; Attendees 2,584; Continuing Education Units (CEUs) issued 111 (December 20 – November 21)

Goal 2.3: Explore opportunities to enhance Mobile Crisis Response & Crisis Stabilization Services.

Crisis services include crisis lines accepting all calls and dispatching support based on the assessed need of the caller; mobile crisis teams dispatched to wherever the need is in the community; and crisis receiving/stabilization facilities that serve everyone that comes through their doors from all referral sources.

Activities & Successes:

- FY21: Initiated & facilitating ongoing dialogue with McHenry County Chiefs of Police and County Admin re: Co-Responder Programs (ongoing)
- FY21: Initiated potential partnership with NAMI, Rosecrance and ILDHS-DMH re: Living Room Models (ongoing)
- Participating on the IDHS Strategies for implementation of 988 committee
- Funded McHenry County Sheriff's Office (MCSO)

Police Social Worker (PSW) program at \$300,000; participating in development and coordination of program; providing consultation regarding outcome measurement and processes

- $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$ Participating in State Pathways to Success rollout
- Participating in coordination with MCSO PSW program, Northwestern Medicine's Crisis - Doty Road ER, Emergency Services, Municipal Law Enforcement, and Rosecrance's Mobile Crisis Response (MCR).

Goal 4.1: Monitor, represent and adapt as needed to legislative, planning and policy efforts impacting the MCMHB Network.

As opportunities arise, MCMHB staff will participate in legislative, planning, and policy related activities and use these opportunities to advocate for the needs of McHenry County residents and providers. (e.g. MCMHB staff participates in various trade association meetings, taskforces, committees, etc.)

- MHB participates on the ACMHAI Legislative/Medicaid/ IDD/Children's Behavioral Health Committees, CBHA Integrated Primary/Behavioral Healthcare Committee, 988 Key Stakeholder Coalition ILHFS Medicaid Advisory Committee, IL Supreme Court Mental Health & Justice Taskforce, and is a member of several trade industry associations.
- Provided advocacy and testimony to defeat SB1883-COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH TAX (FY21)
- MCSO to present the Police Social Worker program at ACMHAI quarterly meeting in response to CESSA and Public Act law changes (December 21)
- Funded CIT training for law enforcement (October/ November 21)



McHenry County Deaths by Overdose



MCMHB Network Outcomes are comprised of domains that embody meaningful, real life outcomes for people who are striving to attain and sustain recovery; build resilience; and work, learn, live, and participate fully in their communities. Over 30 evidence-based practices and various validated tools are utilized.

Network Enhancements

McHenry County Co-Responder Police Social Worker Program

The McHenry County Mental Health Board, the McHenry County Board and the McHenry Sheriff's Office partnered to develop and fund the McHenry County Co-Responder Police Social Worker Program. The mission of this groundbreaking program, which began at the end of 2021, is to bridge the gap between law enforcement and social services in McHenry County



by connecting citizens with mental health resources and long-term resolutions, in order to alleviate the obligation of law enforcement's response to mental health-related calls for service. This program will be expanding to other police agencies to help bridge the gap between law enforcement and the county's network of social service providers. We're proud to be part of this solution in handling crisis situations more effectively in our community.

The Bright Program - a Partnership of NISRA and Pioneer Center for Human Services

The Bright Program is a new and unique opportunity where the efforts of NISRA and Pioneer Center for Human Services come together to expand adult day program services to the western side of McHenry County located in Huntley, IL.



The Bright Program is for adults with developmental disabilities ages 22 and over to participate in a smaller group day program in their own community. With the partnership between NISRA and Pioneer Center, participants will have access to opportunities and activities that are offered by both organizations at one location.

Clearbrook West

In 2015, Clearbrook expanded into Crystal Lake to help meet the needs of the communities surrounding McHenry County. Programs and services such as



home-based, community day programs, residential, vocational, and respite are offered. The goal of these programs is to help individuals be as successful as possible in their home and community.

Clearbrook West opened its first CILA (Community Integrated Living Arrangement) home in Crystal Lake in the spring of 2018. Since 2018, Clearbrook West has opened two additional CILA homes in Crystal Lake, one for six women and another for six men. Clearbrook West hopes to be opening a fourth home in Woodstock in 2022. Annually, Clearbrook West supports over 250+ individuals, as well as their families, in McHenry County, in over 39 communities and 8 locations throughout northern Illinois.








Fee-for-Service (FFS)

Payments for each event of service. When possible, rates are based on those set by the State of Illinois.

Standard Grant (GRANT)

Provides funds for access to specific care or the infrastructure of a program and requires year-end reconciliation of actual expenses.

Pay-for-Performance Grant (P4P)


Payment is predicated on the reporting MHB defined output and outcome data. Pay-for-Performance Grants primarily support access to Psychiatric/Prescriber services.

Purchase of Position (POP)

Payment for a particular staff position critical to the delivery of an approved service or program for which Fee-for-Service funding is not applicable.


